Africa is very rich in raw materials. Some of these materials are minerals such as copper, iron ore, bauxite, oil and manganese. Other raw materials include coffee, cotton, groundnuts, tobacco and rubber. All these materials must be processed in various ways in order to be useful to man.

In the past, Africa was used by Europe and North America as an important source of raw materials. Most of the raw materials were exported to be processed in Europe and North America. Tin for example, was exported from Nigeria so that cans could be manufactured. Cocoa was grown in Ghana for European factories to turn into bars of chocolate or chocolate drinks. Iron ore from Liberia was used in Europe for making steel.

African countries are now trying to process more of their raw materials for their own use. For example, much of the bauxite mined in Ghana will soon be sent to an alumina plant being built in Ghana, where it will be processed to aluminum. This means that one day Ghana will no longer need to import aluminum, thus saving money. In addition, more jobs will be created for the Ghanaian population.

There are also many examples from Tanzania, Kenya and Uganda. Leather is turned into foot wear and pineapples are canned for home consumption and export in Kenya while Tobacco is turned into Cigarette in Dar es Salaam. Apart from being a valuable export commodity, cotton is also woven into cloth in mills at Arusha, Jinja, Eldoret, Mwanza, Dar es Salaam and many other places. Moreover some of the Soda from Lake Magadi is used to make glass bottles in Mombasa.

However, Tanzania Kenya and Uganda are all still primarily agricultural countries. Industrial development still has a long way to go. A successful manufacturing industry can only be developed and sustained if the local population is large and wealthy enough to buy its products in quantity. It is for this reason that emphasis in government planning is at this stage much on rural development.

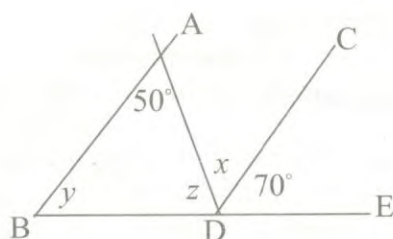
